Texarkana Gameday has become a household name in our community. I remember when I first heard that the local football games were being broadcasted live. Seems like it was yesterday! It was such a new and innovative connection from high school football fields to families sitting at home. Then the pandemic hit and the whole world stopped.

Entrepreneur Morgan Smith has always had a love of sports. Being involved in local games had become a hobby for him. He never thought it would one day turn into the small business he operates today. In July of 2019, Morgan had this idea so he made a few calls and asked "Is this a stupid idea?" He was met with an abundance of positivity and support.

Red River Lumber partnered with Morgan in creating a set for Texarkana Gameday. "They just gave it to us. That's when I knew I had to see this through," he said during an interview with entrepreneur and podcaster, Joseph Peel. "Looking back on it now, the pregame shows weren't that great but it wasn't about us. It was about the kids. It was about getting them on the show to talk and be heard."

Morgan credits Dr. Matt Young with Texakana Emergency Center & Hospital and Joe Nichols with State Bank for a great deal of support during this start up. "They

have been the pillars for us and really helped us grow," Morgan said. "We would not be here today if not for them." He has a great deal of pride when he talks about his team and the hard work it has taken to get to this point. Morgan's family has played a huge role in this endeavor. His wife, Jennifer, and children, Stella, Walker, and Will have been a great help in supporting this from day one.

When the pandemic hit, no one knew what would come of the daily things that made up a life. It was a challenging time for everyone, but the Texarkana Gameday team knew this had to keep going. They worked even harder to stay safe and bring live updates to families back home who couldn't be at games. They worked closely with local school administration leaders to ensure that every game, live stream, and interview was a success. Texarkana Gameday had set the standard for commitment to their community and created unity for all local families during a truly unpredictable time in history.

However this isn't the only endeavor that Morgan, his

family, and his team operate for their surrounding commu-Texarkana Marketing, nities. Longview Gameday. and Phone Pros of Texarkana are also successful. Texarkana Marketing teams up with Texarkana Gameday with a great deal of time and talent to getting incredible photos in the studio and on the field. "We share those photos with everyone in the community and we don't charge the athletes for them either." Morgan said. The schools also involve their Audio & Visual classes to be а part of Texarkana Gameday. Students in Liberty- Eylau TV, Tiger Vision, and PGTV, and Rabbit TV help make the videography for Texakana Gameday.

"So many people think we are a big company," Morgan said. "But it is just a few paid staff members, dedicated interns, and local community members coming together to make this happen."

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

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

Pumpkin Carving





Nartti (McMurry) Blankenship was first diagnosed with cancer on October 3, 2009, at the age of 15. She had stage III fibrolamellar hepatocellular carcinoma, which is a rare form of liver cancer according to www.cancer.govbecauseitforms in healthy livers. It often forms in teenagers and adults under 40 years old.

After a devastating phone call from her doctor, Martti's dad, Tony McMurry, delivered the news. "Surprisingly I did not cry. I remember saying something like, 'Okay, so now what do we do?" Martti remembered being more worried about missing school than the events that would soon take place. As a sophomore at Texas High, she was involved with marching band and the dance/drill team. She didn't want to miss any games or practices, but it was best for her to stay home during her treatments.

Shortly after her diagnosis, she had surgery to remove her gall bladder and 60% of her liver. She began chemotherapy which made her feel sick a lot, but she looked at the time in the hospital with her dad by her side as a silver lining. "My dad and I spent a lot of the time in the hospital watching our favorite TV show, Friends." She struggled with retaining friends from school during this time, too. She felt like it may have been hard for other kids to understand what she was going through. "Maybe they just did not know how to interact with me. However, the amount of people I gained support from during that time grew tenfold," Martti remembered. She went into remission in February 2010.

Shortly after that, Martti moved to Killeen, Texas to live with her mother, Kristen Edwards. She continued to live cancer free. In September 2010, she started dating Zach Blankenship not knowing that in just one short month she would receive another heartbreaking diagnosis.

Her cancer had relapsed, but this time it was stage IV. She knew what the road ahead had in store for her. She underwent more chemo, and another surgery to remove the tumors located in her abdomen

followed by chemo again. The treatment during her second diagnosis was more difficult



than the first. It took a toll on her mentally, emotionally, and physically in a completely different way than the first time. "I was scared because I knew what I had to go through again. I had just grown my hair out long enough to not have to wear a hat or a wig," Martti said. And this time I had a boyfriend, so I did not know how he would react."

At 16 years old, Zach stood by Martti's side through it all. During this round of treatment, she received a portable chemo pump that she kept in a little purse. I was able to spend more time with Zach outside of a hospital. In July of the following year, Martti was once again in remission. She has been cancer free ever since.

Two years ago Martti decided to give back to the cancer

c o m m u n i t y by volunteering at Camp Dream Catcher, a camp through Baylor Scott & White Hospital in Temple, TX. "It is a week-long camp for kids with cancer and

their siblings. The kids can just be kids," Martti said. "They get to do things they would not usually be able to do like a highropes course, horseback riding, and zip lining." Martti's knows first hand how those kids at Camp Dream Catcher feel and that makes being their advocate a truly rewarding experience.

Although has it been 13 years since had Martti she cancer, continues to have yearly scans for her own peace of mind. "Even though it was the toughest time of my life, I would not change anything because it has made me the fighter and hard worker that I am today. "

Martti has a little advice for any child going through cancer and the parents who stand beside them. "Talk about your hopes and fears, whether it is with your parents or close friends. Find humor in whatever you can because laughter really is the best medicine. Hug your parents often because even though they might not show it, they are scared too. Always remember you are not alone, so lean on your loved ones during the times you are not able to stand on your own. Always keep fighting. You are strong."

And for the parents: "You will be focused on your child's health and doctor's appointments, but remember they are kids and they want to feel as normal as possible. Let their little fingers get dirty and let them paint or play in

the makeup, even if you just disinfected the 50 counters times. Let them whatever eat they feel like eating because a lot of the time, they may not be able to keep anything down, let them SO enjoy it. If they



are homebound, let them call their friends on the phone because they might be missing out on big moments like a homecoming dance, games, dance competitions, or their senior prom. Let them enjoy as many of the big and little moments as possible. But most importantly, take care of yourselves too."

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Standing **T-ALL** Staying *Frang*

Denior year of high school is always an exciting adventure, but for Sam Prewitt it is truly a celebration.

Sam was only 14 years old when he was diagnosed with Acute Lymphocytic Leukemia or ALL for short. His form of leukemia was specific to the t-cells, known as T-ALL. According to www.healthline.com T-ALL is a subcategory of ALL. "It primarily affects early forms of cells that become T-cells. T cells are a type of white blood cell that attacks foreign invaders and produces cytokines that activate other parts of your immune system." The bone marrow and thymus make blood stem cells (immature cells) that become mature blood cells over time. A blood stem cell may become a myeloid stem cell or a lymphoid stem cell. In Sam's case, the t-cells did not mature correctly and collected in the thymus which caused swelling in his thymus. This caused the thymus to push on the heart.

Sam's pediatrician, Annie Baker, recognized there was a problem and recommended they go immediately to Dallas for a specialized diagnosis at Children's Medical Center. That is when Sam received his diagnosis and started treatment. Sam and his family did not let this diagnosis define his future. "I wasn't worried at first. I didn't really know much about leukemia, so it was easy to stay positive as I was learning," Sam said. His parents, Cliff & Lindsey, credit their faith in knowing that everything will be okay to having a strong faith in God.

His first treatment consisted of steroid injections and was immediately followed by chemotherapy.

The steroids shrunk the mass considerably. Lindsey and her son lived at the hospital for a month. Sam finished his 8th grade year as a Red Lick student remotely as well as his freshman year of high school at Texas High. It was important that he started the intense chemotherapy as soon as possible and continued for 25 days.



Once the treatment was complete, he received a report of complete remission. However, Sam wasn't out of the woods just yet. He would require maintenance chemotherapy for 3 years.

Staying in the hospital for a month can really take a toll on a kid's life, but Sam was able to stay in touch with a lot of his friends by playing Xbox. "My friends didn't really understand what was going on with me, but they were always asking me how I was doing, "Sam said. "Plus I got to play Xbox with them while I was at the hospital so that was nice." The Prewitt family received a lot of support from their friends, family, and community alike. "It means a lot to know that people were asking about me, and even donating money to help with the costs of everything," Sam said.

Sam recently rang the bell signifying the

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end of his chemotherapy and he is so excited to see what the next chapter holds. "I am so excited to not have to worry about my port anymore," Sam said. "Now I can get into the water without worrying about my port." Now that the chemotherapy is finished, Sam will have a different treatment plan for maintenance which includes monthly lab draws for a year and a half, then every two months. He will also start seeing an Oncologist that specializes in his type of cancer in adults instead of pediatrics, followed by an echo cardiogram of his heart every five years to ensure that the chemotherapy hasn't caused any long term damage.

Recently Sam and his family participated in the Tough Kookie Foundation's First Annual Yellow Pedal Out Childhood Cancer. Participants could ride their bikes on a specific course to bring awareness and raise funds for a world without cancer. Sam's friends and family supported him during his bike ride of about one mile. Sam is set to graduate high school in May of 2025. He plans to pursue a career in engineering.


